Jesus washing the disciples' feet

We received this report on "The Narrow Road" held at Hertford URC.

'I am very happy to report that we were at full capacity and really could not have squeezed another visitor in as staging and lighting also took up a considerable amount of space. We had approximately 110 people attending with some travelling quite a distance. We have had many comments from other local churches thanking us for putting on this production as part of our combined journey towards Easter and saying how they found the Play very moving and thought-provoking.

It was quite amazing how four Actors took us through the life of Jesus in an hour and a half without a change of background, just by using simple props. It was helpful to have a knowledge of the Bible to keep up with these dramatic snapshots, as seen by travellers on a narrow road, who were also acting as the characters in each of the scenes. A very skilful use of a small area and a small cast who made it all so believable.'

Commemorative Trowel – returned to Ealing Green Church

Back in January 2023 I received a letter from the Netherlands, with some photos of a commemorative trowel, from the laying of the foundation stone of Ealing Congregational Church. The accompanying letter explained that this trowel was in the possession of a Mr. Paul Sanders, he assumed it was ours and would we like it back? After a few emails to each other, it was agreed that he would return it in person, when he was next in the UK. Then in December last year Paul emailed again and offered to come to Ealing in March.

The day arrived, and Paul came to the church with his family – his wife, daughter and her husband – along with the trowel, safely stowed in a wooden box. I invited them into the church, and imagine my delight when I saw the beautiful commemorative trowel in person. The photos Paul had sent had been water damaged in the post, and the real object is quite beautiful.

The centenary booklet issued by Ealing
Congregational Church in 1960, confirms the
inscription on the trowel. The booklet says that in
1859 the old Grove Chapel (built in 1822, where the
Grove School stands today) was sold and the present
site acquired. The corner foundation stone was laid
on 3rd November 1859, by the Rt Hon David Wire, Lord
Mayor of London. The new building was erected on
the site of a house which formerly belonged to a 'great
Puritan Divine', Dr John Owen. Our fathers indeed
claim to have built on good foundations! By the way,
you can still see the foundation stone to the left of the
doors, although the inscription is sadly eroded.

I showed the family the church space, and then over coffee we discussed some of the history of the



church, and of Ealing, and they explained that it was really quite difficult to find us, as Ealing Congregational Church no longer exists. The trowel had been in the possession of Paul's father, and they do not know how he came to have it; although he did work in London while docklands was being redeveloped, and maybe he came across it at that time. The family had decided to take a trip to London for a holiday and return the trowel to us in person. What a remarkably generous thing to do! I know that you will all be thrilled to have such an important piece of our history returned to us, and how kind to do so in person.



I am sure that you will all wish to join me in thanking Paul and his family for the care and attention they have taken in tracking us down, and then handing over in person this trowel, which presumably has some value as a historic item. Thank-you!

The trowel is currently in the safe, stored in its wooden box, if you'd like to see it in person, please ask Colin or Helen on Sundays, or I will be happy to get it out during the week.
